

Report on our trip to Windsor

We thank Peter Rea for his report on our very enjoyable trip to Windsor on Friday, 24th June, and we have pleasure in including it below.

Last Friday BWHS organised a bus trip to the Hawkesbury Regional Museum and the adjacent Howe House; both proved to be very interesting. 24 members, including two from the 'Dharug and Lower Hawkesbury Historical Society', thoroughly enjoyed the day. Coastal Liners provided the transport and the driver gave lots of informative comment and quite a few jokes along the way. We stopped for morning tea at the Cumberland State Forest picnic grounds at West Pennant Hills.

We arrived at the museum in Windsor around 10.15 am. This is the only publicly run, professionally staffed museum in the wider Hawkesbury area, which includes the Blue Mountains, Penrith, Hills, Blacktown (pre-amalgamation) local government areas. The smartly dressed employees and volunteer staff welcomed us and were on hand to provide additional information.

The museum featured numerous multi-media exhibitions, combining artefacts, photographs, scale models, maps and video with simple, easily understood written information. Most displays were presented in crisp, bright perspex cases standing on white plinths, while a few older display cabinets were suitably utilised to exhibit some pieces. The interior of the museum presented a bright, very uncluttered open feel, with high ceilings and predominately white walls, some featuring suitably coloured displays or with murals.

Windsor is one of Australia's oldest settlements and the various exhibitions traversed from the earliest times; subjects were diversified from the first great Hawkesbury flood, river traffic, through to the war years and more recent times.

Windsor Report (cont'd)

We were given a guided tour of the adjacent Howe house, built between 1827 and 1837, which gives an atmosphere that takes visitors back to those days. The below ground cellar, kitchen and servants' quarters were particularly fascinating.

Lunch, included, was at the Windsor RSL and was excellent. While special diets were catered for, most people enjoyed the extra lean and thinly sliced roast beef and vegetables followed by a mini fruit pavlova (much better than average) for dessert. About an hour was spent with good food and good conversation. We were delivered safe and sound back to West Gosford at 3.45pm.

All round a great day was had, with many thanks to Margaret Pearce for the organisation.

If this trip is anything to go by, our next outing should not be missed.

NPWS Award

In 2015 a Gosford Council grant was auspiced by the Brisbane Water Historical Society to enable members Dora and Peter Rea to present six years of their research work on Broken Bay/Hawkesbury River Ferry tours.

In Broken Bay is an old fortification called West Head Fort (WHF). Research started on this site about five years ago, when a small group of like-minded interested people, including Peter and Dora came together, they called themselves WHAT the 'West Head Awareness Team'.

Once protecting the river route to the Hawkesbury Rail Bridge plus the entrance to Pittwater and Brisbane Water, WHF has lay all but forgotten for the past seventy years, out of sight to all but a few 'boaties'. Ordinance consisted of 4.7" naval guns, however, the most fascinating thing about the fort was the 150m long inclined railway which ran from Commodore Heights down to the guns. Virtually all trace of this railway has disappeared along with any photographs or drawings. Gradually the old fort gave up its secrets to WHAT and this public awareness prompted a proposal to make the site accessible again.

Dora and Peter worked with the Royal Australian Artillery Association and with 93 year old Jack 'Bluey' Mercer who was 18 when he was stationed at WHF in 1941. Bluey's fantastic memory provided details of the way the railway looked and how it worked. This allowed Peter to complete new drawings of the railway and he also compiled a record of on-site photographs.

The first recognition of all this work came to WHAT via a 2014 NSW Heritage Award. This was followed by the Minister for Heritage and Environment, Rob Stokes, highlighting the WHF work in a speech to NSW Parliament. The Member for Gosford also endorsed the individual research work of Dora and Peter in another speech to Parliament.

At a West Head open day in November 2014, Peter had the opportunity to personally talk with Minister Stokes about his proposal to have a working diorama and model built. 18 months later the Minister and Peter unveiled the completed two working models at Commodore Heights directly above the old fort's gun emplacements. Also opened that day was the reconstructed soldiers' track that, for first time in 70 years, allows safe public access to the site.

NPWS Award (cont'd)

The ultimate concept for Dora and Peter's work is to present local/Australian history by combining dioramas, models, graphics, historical and site photos with video, to create multi-media, interactive exhibitions. A meeting held on 7 June at Bobbin Head indicated NPWS would be seeking funding to allow this final stage of the project to proceed.

Footnote: On Friday 17 June 2016, Peter was in Sydney undertaking further research when Dora phoned him to say an envelope had just been hand delivered which contained two individual NPWS Awards for 'Outstanding Achievement'.

SNIPPET

Here is some interesting information about our \$2 coin and the former \$2 note. It's extracted from Australian Geographic online, so it's easy to find and to read the full article.

On June 20, 2016 it was 28 years since the \$2 coin replaced the \$2 bank note. The note was introduced in 1966 with the Australian dollar and decimal currency. The \$1 and \$2 paper notes had an incredibly short circulation life and the \$1 note was replaced by a coin in 1984, followed by the \$2 coin in 1988. The \$2 note was heavily used and it was only lasting about six months but the \$2 coin was expected to last around 30 years. They cost about the same to produce so it was much more cost effective to move to the \$2 coin.

Decimal currency was first introduced in Australia on 14th February 1966. (Who of us that were around then can ever forget that jingle from Dollar Bill "In come the dollars and in come the cents, to replace the pounds and the shillings and the pence ... "

Prime Minister Menzies and Treasurer Harold Holt originally named this currency "the Royal", however this proved unpopular. Other names suggested at the time were the Dinkum, the Kwid, the Austral, and the Merino. Thankfully they were also unpopular and the Dollar was finally agreed on.

The \$2 note was among the first to be released. (It was green and had John Macarthur and a Merino sheep on the front, and William Farrer and wheat on the back, just in case you've forgotten). The \$50 note was introduced in 1973 and the \$100 note in 1984 (that was the former blueish grey one but then changed to the pretty yellow-green polymer one in use now). (I rarely see one ... ed).
